MEDICAID EARLY INTERVENTION INITIATIVE

Children with Medicaid

Sometimes children are made eligible for Medicaid after they have been found eligible for Early Intervention. In some cases their eligibility is made retroactive which makes the timely entry into the VAMMIS system problematic. In those cases where a child is made eligible for Medicaid retroactive, please send an email to Ms. Keisha L. White (keisha.white@dbhds.virginia.gov) with a copy to David Mills (david.mills@dbhds.virginia.gov) stating the ITOTS ID of the child and the date their Medicaid was made retroactive to. This will give the Part C Office the information that is needed to enroll the child on their correct eligibility date.

Fast Facts:

- 2943 children were enrolled in the Medicaid Early Intervention program in January;
- 109 providers are enrolled as Medicaid Early Intervention Providers (Local Lead Agencies, provider agencies and independent practitioners); and
- 926 practitioners have been granted early intervention certification.

FAMIS Select

The **FAMIS** *Select* program allows families to choose between covering their children through **FAMIS** or through a private or employer-sponsored health plan. Children enrolled in FAMIS Select are not eligible for the Medicaid EI program. For more information about FAMIS Select, see: http://www.famis.org/select.cfm?lang=English

FAMIS Select has been added to the list of potential third party payors in ITOTS. This should be checked rather than Medicaid/FAMIS for children whose coverage is Medicaid Select.

Agency Affiliations

System Managers are asked to check their agency affiliations in ITOTS. To do this, please navigate to the "Administrator" section and click on "Local System". There you will find three tabs, one labeled "Local System" which is where you can update your local system information. The second tab is labeled "Contacts" and is where you list the contacts you would like to use if another system receives a likely match message when adding a child record to ITOTS. The third is labeled "Agencies". This is where you go to list all your agency affiliations. To add an agency, click on the green plus to the right of the word "Agencies" and select an agency from the list. Please note that an agency with multiple offices will have the city in which the office is located in parentheses following the agency name. After selecting the agency, please click save to record the addition. To the right of each agency listing there is a hyperlink labeled "Delete". Please use this when your relationship with that agency has concluded. We request that you have your agencies updates in ITOTS by March 1.

Practitioners are asked to log into the certification database (https://www.eicert.dbhds.virginia.gov/Logon.aspx) and to check to be sure that all agency affiliations are current and that all local systems within which you will provide services are listed. The certification user manual (https://www.infantva.org/documents/ei-Cert-

<u>usermanual.pdf</u>) describes the process and procedures for creating agency affiliations beginning on page 8.

Referral Requirements

Part C Participating Agencies are required to comply with Federal and State Regulations, Policies and Procedures and Practices, including those related to child find and referral. In addition, as part of the early intervention certification process, individual practitioners sign assurances that they will comply with the requirements.

Federal Part C regulations (Sec. 303.321) require an effective method for making referrals by primary referral sources no more than 2 working days after a child is identified as potentially eligible. Primary referral sources listed in the federal regulations include hospitals, including prenatal and postnatal care facilities; physicians; parents; day care programs; local educational agencies; public health facilities; other social service agencies; and other health care providers. All Part C participating agencies are considered primary referral sources and are obligated to refer potentially eligible children to the local Infant & Toddler Connection system. This requirement is emphasized in Chapter 3 of the Infant & Toddler Connection of Virginia Practice Manual. The family may exercise their option to decline Part C services when contacted by the local Infant & Toddler Connection system, but the referral must be made to ensure the family has the opportunity to make an informed choice about their participation in Part C. The following script is an example of how a private provider who is a Part C participating agency and receives a referral directly from a doctor or hospital, for instance, might explain this to a family:

Sample Script

Since your child is under age three, you may be eligible for early intervention services through the Infant & Toddler Connection of _______. We need to make a referral to the Infant & Toddler Connection system, and (name of person) will then contact you to explain early intervention, including who is eligible and what services are available. With your permission and at no cost to you, a service coordinator will work with your family and other professionals to determine whether or not your child is eligible. If your child is eligible, continuing service coordination, assessment, and team meetings are provided at no cost. Other services your child needs may be paid for by Medicaid, private insurance or family fees, and no family is denied services based on an inability to pay. In addition, there are specific rights and procedural safeguards for your child/family when you participate in the early intervention system. You have the option to accept or decline any services through the Infant & Toddler Connection, and if you prefer to come to (our agency) instead of receiving services through early intervention, they will help transition you to us for services. They can also connect you with other resources in your locality that you may need or want.

DMAS Fiscal Agent Transition

On or before July 2010, DMAS will transfer all Fiscal Agent and Provider Enrollment Services functions from First Health Services Corporation (FHSC) to ACS State Healthcare (ACS). ACS State Healthcare will takeover existing operations historically performed by FHSC including

claims processing, provider enrollment, electronic data interchange (EDI), checks/remittances and electronic funds transfers (EFTs), web-based and telephonic inquiry applications (Automated Response System and MediCall), and member eligibility functions. COMPREHENSIVE SYSTEM OF PERSONNEL DEVELOPMENT (CSPD)

Professional Development Surveys

The Integrated Training Collaborative (ITC) recently completed two professional development surveys to assist the Collaborative and the Part C office in planning activities for CSPD. The first survey was sent to all certified practitioners. The second survey was emailed to local system managers and clinical directors/infant program directors. The evaluation reports and a one page summary for each survey are now available on the Integrated Training Collaborative web page.

Professional Development/Training included in Standard Rate:

Through technical assistance requests to the Part C Office, it has been expressed that there is not a clear understanding of what is encompassed in the EI reimbursement rate, including the expectation that practitioners participate in trainings and team meetings. On October 1, 2009, Virginia's Early Intervention System Transformation went into full effect. As part of that transformation, a standard early intervention reimbursement rate was established which includes professional development/training. Additionally, providers completed the online credentialing modules and applied to become a certified Virginia Early Intervention practitioner. On the Practitioner Application for Certification, each practitioner agreed (by his/her signature) to several assurances and acknowledgements including:

I understand the early intervention rate incorporates the total cost of providing the face-to-face service including travel time and costs, documentation, supervision, training, billing, and support staff time, in addition to the personnel costs for the individual providing the direct service.

Cognitive, Emotional, and Social Development Are Connected: You Can't Do One Without the Other

"Cognitive, emotional, and social capacities are inextricably intertwined in the brain, and, in like fashion, learning, behavior, and both physical and mental health are highly interrelated throughout the life course. One domain cannot be targeted without affecting the others. The brain's multiple functions operate in a richly coordinated fashion: Emotional well-being and social competence provide a strong foundation for emerging cognitive abilities, and together they are the bricks and mortar that comprise the foundation of human development. The emotional and physical health, social skills, and cognitive-linguistic capacities that emerge in the early years are all important prerequisites for success in school and later in the workplace and community."

The Center for the Developing Child at Harvard University recently added a new interactive feature to their Web site that explains core concepts in the science of early childhood development through images and text. It discusses how brains are built over time; the interaction
